Winter Discovery Center Going up This Fall

Excellence in Education and Lahontan Foundation fund classroom

Thanks to funding from Excellence in Education, Lahontan Community Foundation and private fundraising, a 30' yurt will be constructed this fall at the Tahoe Cross Country Center. The new Winter Discovery Center will begin hosting students in January 2009 as a pilot program for 3-5th grades.

This collaborative effort will be implemented by Tahoe XC and SWEP, with support from partnerships with CA State Parks, Tahoe City PUD and volunteers.

The curriculum will primarily focus on winter ecology and winter fitness, with art, games and discovery 'hikes' as the core activities. Older students will conduct science experiments and learn monitoring protocol. All students will receive a journal to record their lessons and to use as reference for home and school.

This program will provide an opportunity for youth that does not already exist, and it will compliment the array of environmental education opportunities currently available in our region. We owe a huge thanks to Marisa Lopez, who took the volunteer initiative to write successful grants to fund our classroom!

Jr. Naturalist: A Success For All Seasons SWEP expands Jr. Botanist for Winter Program



When you learn something or someone's name, you begin to form a relationship. Once a relationship is formed, caring begins.

Books such as Last Child in the Woods, and a recent call by California state legislators to "Leave No Child Inside" highlight the concerns of many: that children are not spending time in the outdoors and this is affecting their health (childhood obesity rates are at about 30%) and well being. A 2002 study found that 25 percent of 8year olds could name more Pokemon characters than wildlife species (Sacramento Bee, Sept. 17,

2007). SWEP wants that statistic to be different for our region's youth.

The Jr. Naturalist program will expand the popular Jr. Botanist program to include wildlife and habitats. Students will have the opportunity to earn their jr. botanist and jr. biologist titles to become a jr. Naturalist.

Participants in our Winter Discovery Program (a pilot program for 2009) will work toward Jr. Naturalist status.

The program focuses on outdoor experiences which

expose students to the particular plants, animals and habitats near their study (school) site.

Currently, SWEP is working on putting study materials, a plant/animal list and testing criteria on our website.

As a service learning project, students in Maggie Bockius' 4th grade class are going to compile study materials for the Jr. Botanist plants. Look for that soon. In the mean time, stay posted to our website for more program information.

Partnership Highlight: Kevin and Valli Murnane Tahoe Cross Country Ski Education Association
