### Youth Fire Safe Chapter Formed

Students at North Tahoe Middle School have formed the first ever Youth Fire Safe Chapter and already they have something to brag about. On May 21, students in Pat Hamilton's service learning elective hosted an educational event at their school in which all 255 students attended!

These youth have been learning about defensible space, forest health and how to stay safe in an emergency situation. Community guest speakers have come to their classroom, students attended the annual meeting of the Ne-

vada Fire Safe Council and researched topics that they presented to their peers.

Students showed a power point presentation on defensible space, school evacuation procedures, fire wise plants and products we use that come from trees.

The Nevada Fire Safe Council has chapters throughout the Tahoe Basin. Their mission is to create an organization that serves as a bridge between fire services and public agencies, and communities threatened by wild-fire.

### Community Wetland Celebration & Historic Fish Hatchery Tours June 9 12-1:30pm

The Historic Fish Hatchery building located at the corner of Hwy. 28 and Lake Forest Dr. has quite a history. The first state owned and operated fish hatchery opened near Tahoe City in 1889. This hatchery had inadequate water supply, and was moved to the current location. The building was completed in 1920. By 1940, the hatchery operations were deemed inefficient—the water was too cold and fingerlings grew too slowly. Closed in 1956, the hatchery was never reopened as a fish culture station.

In 1975, UC Davis

Tahoe Research Group began using the building as a laboratory. Then in 1996, UC Davis purchased the building for the price of \$1!

The building has undergone a historic renovation and updating of the laboratories and facilities making it a functioning state of the art research facility on the inside.

Join SWEP, UC Davis researchers and staff, and NT middle school students for a fun day at the newly renovated hatchery and surrounding wetland. Come learn what lives there, the research being conducted and check out the new

remodeled Historic Fish Hatchery building!

Students and researcher will be on hand to give tours and answer questions.

Community members are invited to spend lunch hour touring the site and get a sneak preview of the new building. The Grand Opening ceremony will be August 14.

I quickly realized how significant these partnerships are for serving the community, and for getting the job done. By


